From the Pastor's Pen...

Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain, but if it dies it bears much fruit. John 12:24 – NRSV

I am always a bit sad each year as autumn dawns and the light of summer fades away slowly. I love the long days of summer that give us light that helps my garden grow and my flowers to thrive. This year my flowers and plants seem to be still giving me their vibrant flowers and fruit but as the days of light shorten I am reminded that soon the colors of summer in my garden will be gone, retreating for another season of rest, lying dormant waiting for the warmth of spring.




The special offering envelope for October included in all envelope packets are for Lutheran World Relief-In Gathering & for the Capital Repair Fund.

Create some invisible art and then reveal the seasonal design.

What you need:

- Leaves
- White paper
- White crayon (label removed)
- Watercolor paints
- Water
- Paintbrush

What you do:

- 1. Gather leaves of different shapes and sizes. On a table, arrange them flat without overlaps. Set the paper over them.
- 2. Hold the crayon sideways and use the long edge to color over the leaves. You'll make an invisible rubbing of them.
- 3. Then paint over the paper with watercolors. The areas with crayon will resist the paint and reveal the hidden leaf designs.



HIGHLIGHTS-CONGREGATION COUNCIL MINUTES August 16, 2022

Attendance: Council Members: Pastor Brommer, Kendra Ruhl, Ethan Ellenberger, JoEllen Myers, Charis Rossetti, Beth Dunham, Kurt Nielsen, Mark Mariano, Bob Sibert Treasurer: Stephanie Gross, Secretary: Chip Haak, Financial Secretary: Dennis Schwenk

The Congregation Council Meeting was called to order at 7:02pm by Council President JoEllen Myers.

I. Reports:

a. Treasurer's Report: Reports for July were reviewed by Stephanie. Giving for July was excellent. The Net Income for July was \$9,240 and our YTD Net Income is \$10,805. Also provided were the Quarterly reports for the Bryn Mawr Trust Endowment \$711,172. (Decrease in market value for second Quarter \$112,200). BMT Capital Projects account \$250,112.(decrease in market value \$14,454).



- **b. Financial Secretary's Report:** The July report was presented. Denny noted that on his report the YTD Spendin Plan amount should be \$214,032.
- c. Secretary's Report: The minutes from the July 12, 2022 Council meeting were presented.
- **d. Pastor's Report**: **Report** for July 13-August 16, 2022, was emailed to members prior to meeting and reviewed by Pastor.
- e. Correspondence: Thank you for financial support
 - i. Lutheran Camping Corporation-\$345
 - ii. Bethesda Mission-\$350 for folding chairs from Faith In Action
 - iii. Ruth Milliken-Thank you note for Gift card from Congregation and Quilt made by JoEllen Myers.

f. Ministry Teams:

- i. Property Committee:
 - 1. Report from August meeting was presented. Statements regarding what and when SitelogiQ is providing need to be clarified when Jim Huebner returns from cross country trip.
- **g. Welcoming Task Force**: Ethan Ellenberger reported they are exploring ideas and opportunities with an organization called the "Alliance of Affirming Churches of Hummelstown and Hershey."
- h. Extended Ministries: JoEllen Myers presented a recommendation for Council approval.

 Per the recommendation, a motion to donate \$5,000 to Lutheran Disaster Relief to aid flood victims in Kentucky was made by Beth Dunham, second by Bob Sibert. Approved by Council.

II. Unfinished Business:

- a. Vacation Bible School: Successful program with 15 kids attending and several "older kids" assisting. III. New Business:
 - **a. Administrative Assistant position**: Executive Committee and interview group made a recommendation to hire Elizabeth Stuart for 25 hours per week at the rate of \$20.00 per hour. The recommendation was emailed to Council members who unanimously approved it on August 1, 2022. Elizabeth started on August 15, 2022.
 - b. **Search for a new Youth and Family Ministry Director**: Pastor Brommer will be meeting with Charlie Roberts from the Synod for advice on position description.

IV. Informational:

- a. Parish Nurse: Dee Lewin will be relocating in mid-August. Pastor Brommer hopes to acknowledge Dee's 11 years of service at the August 21, 2022, worship service and present her with a framed copy of the pen and ink drawing of the church.
- b. **Tax Exempt Status:** Dauphin County did a review of all churches to recertify status. We submitted an extensive list of required documentation and were notified that our exempt status was approved for the church and parking lots.
- **c. Estate Notifications:** We received notifications that we have been named as beneficiaries in two estates.
- V. Next Council Meeting: September 20, 2022 @7pm [Charis Rossetti will preside]

VI. Adjournment:

A motion to adjourn by Mark Mariano and second by Beth Dunham approved by Council. The meeting concluded at 7:43pm with the Lord's Prayer.

LESSONS FROM GEESE

With the arrival of Fall, it's common to hear geese or see those V-formations in the sky as the geese migrate to their winter or next destination. Perhaps the next time you hear/see them, you too will look at them in a different way as they fly to keep the perfect "V". It's a lovely reminder for us to stop in our hurried lives is for a quick moment to reflect on a few lessons we can learn from one of God's beautiful creatures:

Fact One: As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the bird following it. By flying in a V-formation, the whole flock adds 71% greater flying range than if it flew alone. That's a fact. Seventy-one percent greater flying range than if each bird flew alone,

Lesson: People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they're going quicker & easier because they are traveling on the trust of one another. Strength is found in numbers.

Fact Two: Whenever a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to fly alone and quickly gets back into

formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front.

Lesson: If we have as much sense as geese, we will stay in formation with those who are headed where we want to go and be willing to accept their help, as well as give our help to others.



Fact Three: When the lead goose gets tired, it rotates back into formation and another goose flies at the point position.

Lesson: it pays to take turns doing hard tasks and sharing leadership. With people as with geese, we are interdependent on each other's skills and capabilities and unique alignment of gifts, talents, and resources.

Fact Four: the geese in a formation honk from behind is encouraging those in front to keep up their speed.

Lesson: We need to make sure our honking from behind is encouraging and not something else. In groups where there is great encouragement against great odds, the production is much greater—the power of encouragement. At the center of encouragement is "courage' and the root of courage is a Latin word that means "heart" Maybe honking strengthens the heart.

Fact Five: When a goose gets sick, two geese drop down or stay beside the weak to help and protect it. They stay with it until it is either able to fly again or passes. Then they launch out on their own with another formation or catch up with the flock.

Lesson: Like geese, how wonderful it is when we intentionally stand side by side with one another with compassion to provide encouragement and/ or support in difficult times as well as when we are
