

THE BIDDING PRAYER

On this solemn day we use the ancient Bidding Prayer, offering petitions for the whole world for which Christ died. Since the third century, Christians have gathered on Good Friday at the foot of the cross and there prayed the great intercessions. It is as if the cross is in the center of all things, and as we stand with Mary and John at the cross, the bidding prayer opens us up to ever-widening circles of concern. In these intercessions we ask God to look with mercy on every person and thing in the cosmos.

Silence is observed after each bid.

LORD'S PRAYER



Behold the Life-Giving Cross


